A WORD ABOUT MONEY

A BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVE ON MONEY AND ITS USE

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FOR

THE MINNESOTA SOUTH DISTRICT

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INTRODUCTION

PURPOSE This study is designed to look at the role of money in our society and church from a decidedly Biblical perspective. It is hoped that it will help participants re-think their ideas about money and the priorities they place upon it in their lives.

This study has been developed for use in small groups of between six and twelve people and led by someone from within the group. Spiritual growth and increased knowledge will take place through the discussions generated by the study. The answers for the discussion questions may be humorous, outrageous and thought provoking. There is always at least one correct answer, but sometimes more than one. Suggestions have been made for opening and closing prayers. These suggestions have been designed to enable participants to offer a prayer with either considerable or minimal editorial license.

LEADERSHIP The leader may be the same person throughout the study, or the leadership role may by shared within the group. It is recommended that the study not be led by members of the clergy. Whoever the leader is, the most important thing for the leader to remember is to be an active listener and ensure that all participants have equal opportunity to contribute. Each participant must have the opportunity to respond in some manner to each question. It is not necessary for all participants to agree all of the time. Because small groups tend to become somewhat intimate concerning the information participants share, some Group Guidelines are offered on the following page and should be discussed at the first session.

TIME FRAME Each lesson is designed to last between sixty and ninety minutes. It is up to the group to decide the duration.

Two sample timetables are:

Open/Introduction	15 minutes
Bible Base	30 minutes
Further Study/Close	15 minutes

OR

Open/Introduction 20 minutes
Bible Base 45 minutes
Further Study/Close 20 minutes

It is suggested that time be allowed for additional personal sharing and refreshments.

HOMEWORK Homework for participants is not really necessary, but discussion will be enhanced if participants review the material before each session. Thorough preparation, however, is necessary for the person leading the session.

GROUP GUIDELINES

ANONYMITY: We protect the identity of all group members.

CONFIDENTIALITY: We never discuss anything that is said or done in this

group outside this group without the permission of

those involved.

OTHER-FOCUS: We are here to work on ourselves, not on others. We

share our own experience, insights and feelings.

GIVING ADVICE: We guard against offending one another; If someone

offends us, we work it out *directly* with her or him.

CROSS-TALK: We avoid cross-talk and seek to give each person our

undivided attention.

DEPENDENCY: When we are uncomfortable with anything in this

group, we deal with it ourselves instead of expecting

others to rescue us.

OUTSIDE ISSUES: We avoid discussions and debates about controversial

topics and outside issues.

LIFESTYLE ISSUES: We act toward others in keeping with Biblical beliefs

and principles.

DROPPING OUT: If we want to leave the group prematurely, we will

discuss our reasons with the group.

PREACHING: We do not preach at members of this group.

THE SOURCE OF MONEY

OPEN

Leader: Open this session with a prayer that asks for the Lord's presence with your group and guidance in your discussion.

INTRODUCTION

Leader: Ask all participants to take some currency or coins out of their pockets, purses or wallets. Examine the coins and try to determine where they were minted. Examine the currency and discuss the locations of the Federal Reserve Banks shown on each bill.

Ask each participant to try to determine where they received the coins or the currency that they are now examining.

BIBLE BASE

Leader: Ask volunteers to take turns reading Matthew 25:14-30.

- 14 "Again, it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted his property to them. 15 To one he gave five talents of money, to another two talents, and to another one talent, each according to his ability. Then he went on his journey. 16 The man who had received the five talents went at once and put his money to work and gained five more. 17 So also, the one with two talents gained two more. 18 But the man who had received one talent went off, dug a hole in the ground and hid his master;s money.
- 19 "After a long time the master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them.
 20 The man who had received the five talents brought the other five. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with five talents. See, I have gained five more.'
- 21 "His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!'
- 22 "The man with the two talents also came. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with two talents; see, I have gained two more.'

- 23 "His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!'
- 24 "Then the man who had received the one talent came. 'Master,' he said, 'I knew that you are a hard man, harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed. 25 So I was afraid and went out and his your talent in the ground. See, here is what belongs to you.'
- 26 "His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed? 27 Well then, you should have put my money on deposit with the bankers so that when I returned I would have received it bask with interest.
- 28 "Take the talent from him and five it to the one who has the ten talents. 29 For everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him. 30 And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Leader: Ask someone to read Hebrews 3:1-4.

1 Therefore, holy brothers, who share in the heavenly calling, fix your thoughts on Jesus, the apostle and high priest whom we confess. 2 He was faithful to the one who appointed him, just as Moses was faithful in all God's house. 3 Jesus has been found worthy of a greater honor than Moses, just as the builder of a house has greater honor than the house itself. 4 For every house is built by someone, but God is the builder of everything.

DISCUSS

- 1. What would the writer to the Hebrews suggest is the source of money?
- 2. God is the source of salvation. Jesus, God's son, exercised great faithfulness in the pursuit of salvation a task entrusted to him by God. Does Jesus example suggest how faithful you ought to be in managing the material blessings and money God has entrusted to you? If so, how?
- 2. Jesus received honor for his faithfulness. Do you think God will honor you for your faithfulness? If so, How?

CLOSE

Leader: Ask someone to close this session with a prayer that thanks God for all the money and material blessings he has bestowed and asks for the Holy Spirit's guidance in the management of those blessings.

THE NEUTRALITY OF MONEY

OPEN

Leader: Open this session with a prayer that thanks Jesus for all material blessings such as money and ask for guidance as you study God's Word together.

INTRODUCTION

Leader: Ask participants again to take some currency out of their purses or pockets. Explain that money is neither good or evil by itself. It becomes either good or evil according to the heart of the person that is using.

Ask participants to discuss the various ways to use the money they are holding and determine the merits of its use.

- Buy a lottery ticket
- Give to church
- Buy alcohol
- Give to charity
- Deposit in a bank
- Go out to eat
- Hide it in a mattress
- Pay household bills
- Pay for an abortion

BIBLE BASE

Leader: Ask volunteers to take turns reading Matthew 19:16-30

- 16 Now a man came up to Jesus and asked, "Teacher, what good thing must I do to get eternal life?"
- 17 "Why do you ask me about what is good?" Jesus replied. "There is only One who is good. If you want to enter life, obey the commandments."
- 18 "Which ones?" the man inquired.
- Jesus replied, "'Do not murder, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not give false testimony, 19 honor your father and mother,' and 'love your neighbor as yourself."
- 20 "All these I have kept," the young man said. "What do I still lack?"
- 21 Jesus answered, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me."

- 22 When the young man heard this, he went away sad, because he had great wealth.
- 23 Then Jesus said to his disciples, "I tell you the truth, it is hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. 24 Again I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God."
- 25 When his disciples heard this, they were greatly astonished and asked, "Who then can be saved?"
- 26 Jesus looked at them and said, "With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."
- 27 Peter answered him, "We have left everything to follow you! What then will there be for us?"
- 28 Jesus said to them, "I tell you the truth, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man sits on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. 29 And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields for my sake will receive a hundred times as much and will inherit eternal life. 30 But many who are first will be last, and many who are last will be first."

- 1. Why did the man ask the question of Jesus, "...what good thing must I do to get eternal life?"

- 6. Why were the disciples shocked at Jesus' answer?
 - They felt sad for the rich man
 - They were concerned for all the people that would ultimately be lost
 - They wanted to be rich
 - They believed they had to do something to be saved
 - They were really concerned about themselves
- 7. Peter said that they left all they had to follow Jesus. Why did they do that?
 - They didn't want to work
 - They didn't care about their families
 - They believed that Jesus would take care of them
 - They followed Jesus' command, because they loved him
- 8. How do you think Jesus will reward people today for giving things up for him?
 - He won't reward them at all
 - He will give them eternal salvation

Leader: Ask someone to read Philippians 4:10-13.

10 I rejoice greatly in the Lord that at last you have renewed your concern for me. Indeed, you have been concerned, but you had no opportunity to show it. 11 I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. 12 I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. 13 I can do everything through him who gives me strength.

DISCUSS

- 1. What is the source of Paul's contentment?
- 2. Would it be easier for you to be content if you were in need or if you had plenty?
- 3. What role does rejoicing play in your life? Do you think it could help you become more content?
- 4. Can you decide whether Paul thinks money is good or evil?

CLOSE

Leader: Ask someone to close with a prayer that asks the Lord to remind participants to remember to rejoice and to give them contentment.

THE LOVE OF MONEY

OPEN

Leader: Open this session with a prayer that asks The Holy Spirit's presence during your study to help participants to focus on their complete dependence on Jesus for all that they need

INTRODUCTION

Leader: Ask participants to recall the Civil War of the United States of America. Remind them that confederate soldiers, at the conclusion of the war, were required to sign a oath of loyalty to the United States promising never to take up arms against the Union for the rest of their lives.

Ask participants to discuss the things or the people to which they are loyal.

BIBLE BASE

Leader: Ask volunteers to take turns reading Luke 12:13-21.

- 13 Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me."
- 14 Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or an arbiter between you?" 15 Then he said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions."
- And he told them this parable: "The ground of a certain rich man produced a good crop.

 17 He thought to himself, 'What shall I do? I have no place to store my crops.'
- 18 "Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and there I will store my grain and my goods. 19 And I'll say to myself, "You have plenty of good things laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat drink and be merry."
- 20 "But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?'

21 "This is how it will be with anyone who stores up things for himself but is not rich toward God."

- 1. Why did the man ask for Jesus' help with his inheritance?
 - His brother was cheating him
 - He believed in Jesus as his Lord and Savior

Leader: Ask someone to read 1 Timothy 6:6-10.

6 But godliness with contentment is great gain. 7 For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. 8 But if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. 9 People who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. 10 For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs.

- 1. What is the great gain of godliness and contentment?
- 2. Whether people attain great wealth or not, Paul says that those whose intent in life is to gain wealth will fall into temptation. What sort of temptations do you think people

will encounter?

3. What do you think is the greatest danger of the love of money?

CLOSE

Leader: Ask someone to close with a prayer that asks the Lord's help to avoid the love of money and help people to focus on godliness and for contentment with the blessings God gives you.

THE USE OF MONEY

OPEN

Leader: open this session with a prayer that thanks Jesus For the opportunity to gather together to study his Word again this week and to guide your discussion in directions that are pleasing to him.

INTRODUCTION

Leader: Ask participants to consider the importance of budgeting money. State, local and federal governments struggle annually to set and vote budgets into law. Corporations show the importance of budgets with their emphasis on the "bottom line." Even churches, whether on the local, regional or national level, adopt, and not without great discussion, annual budgets. Many families also budget their household incomes.

Ask participants to develop a budget for their family income by determining what percentage of their income they would designate for the categories listed.

BIBLE BASE

Leader: Ask someone to read Matthew 6:19-24.

- 19 "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. 20 But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. 21 For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."
- 22 "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are good, your whole body will be full of light. 23 But if your eyes are bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness!
- 24 "No one can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he

will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money."

- 9. What is the most important thing that determines the way you use money?
 - Your health
 - What you need
 - Your family
 - Your faith
 - The Bible
 - Current events
 - Peer pressure
 - Other

Leader: Ask someone to read Hebrews 13:1-6.

- 1 Keep on loving each other as brothers. 2 Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some people have entertained angels without knowing it. 3 Remember those in prison as if you were their fellow prisoners, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering.
- 4 Marriage should be honored by all, and the marriage bed be kept pure, for God will judge the adulterer and all the sexually immoral. 5 Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you."
- 6 So we say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can man do to me?"

DISCUSS

- 1. The writer to the Hebrews places a great deal of emphasis on the exercise of Christian virtues through entertaining strangers and remembering those in prison. Is this a way to store up treasures in heaven? If so, how?
- 2. Marriage and family are virtuous and instituted by God. Does that mean that a priority for the use of money is to preserve and perpetuate marriage and the family? If so, how?
- 3. Since Christians have confidence in the Lord and do not need to be afraid, is it proper to set goals for the attainment and use of money? If so, how?

CLOSE

Leader: Ask someone to close this session with a prayer that thanks the Lord for the opportunity to study his Word and asks the Holy Spirit to direct participants to use money in ways that please the Lord.

THE WASTE OF MONEY

OPEN

Leader: Open this session with a prayer that asks that the Holy Spirit to be present during your study so that the thoughts and words of all participants are expressed in a manner that will please the Lord.

INTRODUCTION

Leader: Sharer with participants the following information taken from the 1994 Federal Appropriations Bill of the United States Government:

- \$120,000,000 for a single federal court house in Phoenix, Arizona
- \$38,700,000 for road construction in Alabama via the Appalachian

Regional Commission

- \$34,645,000 for research on the screw worm that has been eradicated from the United States
- \$1,600,000 for "congestion mitigation project" in Syracuse, New York
- \$683,000 for fish laboratory repair in Charleston, South Carolina
- \$600,000 for easing fish migration up the Sacramento River in California

These are just a few examples of waste on the government level. Ask participants to discuss ways they may have wasted money on a personal level

- Lavish home furnishings
- Expensive jewelry
- Luxury car or yacht
- Summer home
- Country Club membership
- Credit card interest
- Tobacco
- Alcohol
- Over eating
- Excessive entertainment

BIBLE BASE

Leader: Ask volunteers to take turns reading Luke 16:1-12.

1 Jesus told his disciples: "There was a rich man whose manager was accused of wasting his possessions. 2 So he called him in and asked him, 'What is this I hear about you? Give an account of your management, because you cannot be manager any longer.'

- 3 "The manager said to himself, 'What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I'm not strong enough to dig, and I'm ashamed to beg-- 4 I know what I'll do so that, when I lose my job here, people will welcome me into their housed.'
- 5 "So he called in each one of his master's debtors. He asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?'
- 6 "Eight hundred gallons of olive oil,' he replied. The manager told him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly and make it four hundred.'
- 7 "Then he asked the second, 'And how much do you owe?' 'A thousand bushels of wheat,' he replied. He told him, 'Take your bill and make it eight hundred.'
- 8 "The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly. For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light. I tell you, use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings.
- 9 "Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. 11 So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? 12 And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else's property, who will give you property of your own?

- 1. Why do you think the manager was wasting the rich man's possessions?
 - He was lazy
 - He was incompetent
 - He was keeping things for himself

Leader: Ask someone to read James 4:1-6.

You quarrel and fight. You do not have, because you do not ask God. 3 When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures.
- 4 You adulterous people, don't you know that friendship with the world is hatred toward God? Anyone who chooses to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God. 5 Or do you think Scripture says without reason that the spirit he caused to live in us tends toward envy, 6 but he gives us more grace? That is why Scripture says: "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble."

CLOSE

Leader: Ask someone to close this session with a prayer that thanks Jesus for the money he has given participants and help them become more responsible managers of the money that he gives us and to look for ways to avoid wasting it.

THE GIVING OF MONEY

OPEN

Leader: Open this session with a prayer that asks the Holy Spirit to be present during your study and help participants to understand the importance of giving money to the Lord.

INTRODUCTION

Leader: Give each participant an offering envelope to examine. Most congregations personalize their offering envelopes and number them to keep track of the offerings of each family or individual. The reason for this kind of record keeping is two-fold. One is to provide an accurate record for the givers. Two is to monitor giving trends to enable the congregation to set a realistic spending guide or budget. Offering Envelopes are usually provided for each week of the year as well as for special occasions.

Ask participants to share how often they use their offering envelopes.

- Weekly
- Bi-weekly
- Monthly
- Whenever it occurs to them
- Once in a while
- Never
- Other

Ask each participant to share the method they use to determine the amount of money they offer to the Lord.

- Tithe (ten percent of gross income)
- A percentage in addition to the tithe
- A percentage less than the tithe
- Whatever is left after all the bills are paid
- A predetermined "round number"
- Whatever they happen to have with them on Sunday morning
- Other

BIBLE BASE

Leader: Ask volunteers to read Luke 21:1-4, and Malachi 3:4-12.

Luke 21:

1 As he looked up, Jesus saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. 2 He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. 3 "I tell you the truth," he said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others. 4 all these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on." Malachi 3:

- 7 "Ever since the time of your forefathers you have turned away from my decrees and have not kept them. Return to me and I will return to you," says the LORD Almighty. "But you ask, 'how are we to return?'

Leader: Ask someone to read Hebrews 7:4-10.

4 Just think how great he [Melchizedek] was: Even the patriarch Abraham gave him a tenth of the plunder! 5 Now the law requires the descendants of Levi who become priests to collect a tenth from the people--that is, their brothers--even though their brothers are descended from Abraham. 6 This man, however, did not trace his descent from Levi, yet he collected a tenth from Abraham and blessed him who had the promises. 7 And without doubt the lesser person is blessed by the greater. 8 In the one case, the tenth is collected by men who die; but in the other case, by him who is declared to be living. 9 One might even say that Levi, who collects the tenth, paid the tenth through Abraham, 10 because when Melchizedek met Abraham, Levi was still in the body of his ancestor.

DISCUSS
